

Currently there is a crisis going on in Ukraine. Over the past few months, Russia has been targeting Ukraine. The reason for this is that Vladimir Putin, Russia's leader, had an initial aim to invade Ukraine and unseat its government, ending for good its desire to join the Western defensive partnership, NATO. Putin failed to capture the capital Kyiv and after a lengthy stalemate, turned his dreams to Ukraine's east and south.

What is the history behind this?

Over the centuries, the Russian and Austro-Hungarian Empires, Poland, and Lithuania have all exercised jurisdiction over Ukraine, which first announced its modern independence in 1917, with the building of the Ukrainian People's Republic. Russia soon turned back control of Ukraine, making it part of the just established Soviet Union and having power in the region until World War II, when Germany invaded.

What are people doing about this crisis?

Many people have been showing their support. President Biden signing the bipartisan Ukraine Supplemental Appropriations Act to deliver an additional \$13.6 billion in military, humanitarian and economic aid to help Ukraine defend itself from Russia's unfair further invasion. People who don't have as much power as Biden have also been helping by putting up flags and letting their loved ones go to help train the Ukrainians.




These are the flags that people have been putting up outside of their homes.

The Disappearance of Madeleine Mccann by Kassidi Houck

Madeleine Mccann was a three year old girl who went missing on May 3, 2007 during a family vacation while her parents dined just 100 feet away. Madeleine was asleep with her two siblings with her parents periodically checking on them. When Maddie's mom, Kate, went to check on the kids at 10:00 p.m. she found Madeleine missing from her bed.

Though the hotel was notified that Maddie was missing **and** there was a sighting of a suspicious man running in the opposite direction holding a child the night Maddie went missing, it took police four days to close off the area and begin a proper search. On May 26, 2007, 23 days after Maddie went missing, police released a sketch of a man that was thought to be a person of interest in the case.

The case went quiet until May 2013, 6 years after Maddie went missing, when British police reviewed the case claiming they've identified a "number of persons of interest" in the case. In 2014, British police seemed to be making progress as they flew to Portugal and searched the resort Maddie went missing from while also planning to make arrests even though no one was ever charged.

The case went quiet again until June 2020, when police revealed a 44 year old German prisoner has been identified as a person of interest in the case. Then, in April 2022, police officially named Christian Brueckner as a suspect in little Maddie's disappearance.

The prime suspect in the case, Christian Brueckner, has a little more of a complicated story. Brueckner, at the time 29, was recently released from jail and wanted a fresh start, so he went to Portugal. When Maddie went missing, Brueckner was only a few miles away from the resort but claims he was never near the resort when the kidnapping took place.

Shortly after the kidnapping became public, Brueckner abruptly left Portugal with no explanation. He layed low and out of the media until April 2020, when police announced they had a new person of interest in the case, a 44 year old who was in jail for unrelated charges. Police didn't reveal his identity until April 2022.

Brueckner has stated he had nothing to do with little Maddie's disappearance and says he has a solid alibi that can be backed up but has yet to provide police with any type of information. Police began to suspect Brueckner while searching property related to another missing persons case, when they found many suspicious items.

The investigation is still ongoing and while Brueckner has provided portuguese police with new information, his claims have yet to be verified. The Mccanns hope to still be reunited with their daughter, who would now be almost 19, alive but hope for closure.


Brownstone


Lake Compounce




Catching Up With Mr. Buckley by Thomas Harris

What Do Dreams Mean? By Marlo Gabriele

Everyone has dreams, in fact you dream every night but you most likely don't remember. Dreams are like taxes: they're inevitable, bound to happen, unavoidable. But, why do we dream? What does it mean? And can dreams tell the future?

So, this brings us to our first question...why do we dream? Dreams are hallucinations mostly occurring during a stage in our sleep called REM (rapid eye movement), which is pretty much self explanatory. An example is if you are climbing up stairs in your dream, your eyes will likely be going up and down, or if you're watching a tennis game they'll go side to side.

But some people become aware of what they are dreaming and can control what they do in their dream. This is called lucid dreaming. Lucid dreaming occurs during REM, because that's when your most vivid dreams occur. If you look at a sleep study, it shows brain activities to be much like they were when the person was awake. Some sleep disorders can cause lucid dreaming, or make you more likely to lucid dream. One study found that people with narcolepsy had a higher frequency of lucid dreams.

But this doesn't mean that you can't lucid dream. In fact, some people train themselves to lucid dream. The trick is to remember your dreams. How do you do that? Keep a journal and write down the dreams you had that night; if you can't remember your dreams, then try drinking 3 large cups of water before bed: you will wake up more often, and this will allow you to recognize dreams more easily once you fall asleep, which in turn can help trigger lucid dreams.

When you're awake, your thoughts have logic in them, to a certain extent at least, and when you sleep your brain is still active, but your thoughts or actions often make little sense. This is likely because emotional centers of the brain trigger dreams rather than logical regions. Though there is no hard evidence or definitive proof, scientists think that, "dreams are usually autobiographical thoughts based on your recent activities, conversations, or other issues in your life," states Healthine. That's why when you have a test or quiz to study for, studying right before bed helps you retain the information you just reviewed.

And humans are not the only ones that do this, birds do too. "Zebra finches are such dedicated musicians that they appear to rehearse their songs during sleep." states New Science "while zebra finches sleep, their brains spontaneously reproduce the activation patterns they make when they sing during the day." Which in turn, perfects their song.

So, this brings us to the question, what do dreams mean? Scientists and researchers still don't entirely know what the role of dreams exactly is, but there are theories and many beliefs as to what dreams mean. Some may include, representing unconscious desires and wishes, interpreting random signals from the brain and body during sleep, and consolidating and processing information gathered during the day.

Many even claimed that their dream told the future. But there is little evidence supporting these claims. Although some research suggests that certain types of dreams can predict the onset of illness or mental decline in the dream, "For example, in people with Parkinson's disease, dreams containing negative emotions are correlated with future cognitive decline" states Sleep Foundation.

Dreams are still a mystery, we haven't done too much research into the subject, but we have our guesses. Science has allowed us to learn much about the human brain, but we may never know for sure the meanings behind our dreams. Because, as WebMD states it, "Dreams have fascinated humanity since the beginning of time and will probably continue to puzzle us."

Sea levels rising. Record breaking temperatures. Intense droughts. Shrinking freshwater supplies. Climate change has been featured in a blur of news stories since it was first reported in the early 19th century. It has since become one of the most prominent and pressing debates in politics throughout the 21st century. As scientists continue to research, note, and graph climate change, millions of people have taken this issue into their own hands. According to the Guardian, over six million people participated in climate strikes worldwide, pressuring our government for action, including the climate strikes of September 20th, 2019; which broke the record for the largest climate change protests in world history. But in order to build an opinion on climate change, and more importantly find a solution, we must understand how climate change works and how it is affecting us right now.

In order to understand this myself, I researched into one of the most dominant organizations in the climate change debate, The Natural Resources Defense Council, otherwise known as the NRDC. They are a non-profit organization, specializing in conservation efforts towards our earth, animal life, and climate change. They argue that not only is climate change an environmental issue, but also relates all the way back to another world issue, the wealth gap. The NRDC stated, "Record floods. Raging storms. Deadly heat. Climate change manifests itself in myriad ways and is experienced by every living being, although not equally. Throughout the world, the economically disadvantaged and people of color—those who have contributed the very least to the root causes of climate change—are the most likely to suffer from its worst impacts." We are not only hurting our environment, but we are also simultaneously making other world issues much worse, and more difficult to fix. We are overwhelming ourselves with issues and climate change itself sits right at the center of it all.

However, in order to fully understand our connection to climate change, we must comprehend what exactly causes climate change. Scientists have discovered that the main root of climate change, lies in our carbon footprint, and how we are damaging our atmosphere. Carbon gasses are released into our atmosphere from processes such as burning fossil fuels, deforestation, and other human activities, and once they reach our lower atmosphere, they slowly cause it to deteriorate. This weaker atmosphere allows higher amounts of the sun's energy and radiation to pass through to our planet, resulting in abnormal weather patterns, increased temperatures, ultimately leading to many dangerous situations for mankind.

So finally, how is climate change affecting us, and why should we care? Climate change will only hurt us worse as time goes on. Right now, we are seeing the mere surface level of effects on us and our planet. Scientists have concluded that recent intense and severe weather, droughts, and temperatures are courtesy of climate change. 7th Grader Weather Connoisseur, Payton Pentino stated, "Due to climate change we are supposed to get 9 - 10 named hurricanes which is around average but due to the rising temperatures of our oceans, it acts as fuel for the storms meaning this hurricane season, the storms will be more powerful bringing 10 - 15% more rainfall, which is all due to the climate crisis." Marine and animal biologists have proven that climate change is a direct source of the recently increasing wildlife extinction rates. Environmental scientists have reasoned that climate change is a direct root of rising sea levels, air pollution, water pollution, and other environmental consequences. We are seeing the effects of climate change firsthand ourselves. Here in Middlebury, we have seen heavy rains and tropical storms, heavy snow in April and October yet barely any from December to February. Record breaking temperatures in the high 90's even closing in on 100 degrees fahrenheit. Weather enthusiast and 7th grader here at Memorial, Payton Pentino stated, "2 years ago we saw temperatures reach 101.5 degrees fahrenheit." 101.5 degrees. Our crops, our summers, our health, will never be the same if this continues. But why? Where is the action?




As you can see, teachers were a big part of this tournament this year. Many students were excited to play them. And even though some of us lost to them, we still had the best time.











A Profile of Lesley Gore: Artist and Activist by Emma Sander

Born Lesley Goldsteinand, but later changed to Lesley Gore, was a singer, songwriter, actor, and activist. She was born May 2, 1946, and died of lung cancer on February 16 2015, and was incredibly well known during her time and after, but throughout her fame, her queerness was often erased and ignored. Gore was a confident, straightforward Jewish lesbian who used her popularity reach to bring awareness to women's rights as well as LGBTQ rights.

When Lesley Gore was only 16, she found Quincy Jones, who would later produce with singers like Michael Jackson, who helped her produce her first song "It's My Party" which was number one on the top one hundred for pop and rhythm and blues which brought a lot of attention to both of them. She had two other hits, "Maybe I Know" and "You Don't Own Me". Gore didn't originally write her own songs at the beginning, but later she was nominated for an Academy Award for "Out Here on My Own", a song that she did write, in the film Fame which was directed by her brother, Michael Gore, and Dean Pitchford. Many of her songs were used in advertisements, campaigns, and other televised things. "You Don't Own Me" was used in many ads supporting marriage equality and reproductive rights, most of her songs were big symbols for feminism and women's rights.

Lesley Gore was popular during her time because of the way she presented herself. She came across as this witty, empathetic, angsty, and heartbroken girl, comforting the other teenage girls who were suffering from heartbreak or self-pity. People loved her because she was in the same boat as her fans. After "You Don't Own Me" came out, it showed another side of her, the side that wasn't just a starry-eyed teen. This started her feminist movement, helping those same heartbroken girls with self-worth and independence in a male-dominated world. At the height of her popularity, she allowed herself to become both a bratty young teen and a strong assertive woman. Her songs went from love-struck to seeking vengeance throughout her albums.

In 2004, Lesley Gore publicly came out as a lesbian while hosting a series on gay and lesbian issues on the PBS series, In the Life. Gore lived in a time when it was frowned upon to not live a heteronormal lifestyle. She said that although the music industry was "totally homophobic," she never felt the pressure to hide her sexuality.

In 2005, while interviewed by Ellen, she explained that she hadn't known she was a lesbian until her 20s. She had dated both men and women, but her first serious relationship confirmed her preferences. Gore didn't feel the pressure to hide her sexuality or let the world know because she felt as though the people who were most important in her life already knew and that was enough.

In the 60s, schooling for women started to flourish and become more common. Gore attended Sarah Lawrence College where she studied British American literature and drama during the height of her career. During her time at school, she explained that "It would be very foolish of me to leave school to go into such an unpredictable field on a full-time basis." She wouldn't let her career get in the way of her higher education so she dedicated only her summers and breaks to producing and touring, which, ultimately, ended up being a pretty smart move. During this time, she volunteered for Robert Kennedy's presidential campaign and explored more political activism while exploring herself as well.

In 2005, Lesley Gore released her final album "Ever since" which was praised and featured on movie soundtracks and tv shows. She died in 2015 from lung cancer and had lived in New York with her dog and partner, Lois Sasson, for at least 30 years. Gore is a very important role model to many people, showing them how to be true to themselves and how to live the life that they want to live.

A History of Mother's Day by Ramin Qurbani

Mother's Day is a holiday celebrated on May 8th, the holiday celebrates mothers, and what they do for us, how they care for us, etc. and presenting them with gifts for what they do. The American version of Mother's Day was created by someone named Anna Jarvis in 1908, but then became an actual, official holiday recognized by the government in 1914. Though, Anna Jarvis denounced the holiday and spent the rest of her life after 1914 trying to remove the holiday from the American calendar.

The first versions of Mother's Day were celebrated by the ancient Greeks and Romans, who held a bunch of festivals in honor of the goddesses of motherhood, fertility, etc. who were named Rhea and Cybele. Though, these holidays might or might not have been the actual roots of Mother's Day. The (also debated) real roots of the holiday is from the Christian festival called "Mothering Sunday".

Mothering Sunday was once a major tradition in the U.K. and some parts of Europe. Mothering Sunday usually fell on the fourth Sunday of Lent. It was originally a time where faithful people of the religion would return to their main church in the area around their home; their "mother church" for a special type of service.

Over time, Mothering Sunday turned into a more secular holiday, where children would just give flowers and other things to their mothers. The custom of this faded in popularity before merging with the American Mother's Day in the 1930s to 1940s.

In the 19th century, before the civil war, Ann Reeves Jarvis helped start "mother's day work clubs" which taught women how to care for their children. These clubs later became a force in a region of the country that was divided. In 1868, Jarvis decided that he was going to organize "Mother's Friendship Day" which was a really early version of Mother's Day.

Another person, Julia Ward Howe wrote the "Mother's Day Proclamation" in 1870. This Proclamation asked mother's to unite to promote world peace. In 1873, Julia Howe also started a "Mother's Peace Day" to be celebrated on June 2nd every year.

Another person, Juliet Calhoun Blakely, probably inspired a Mother's Day celebrated locally in Albion, Michigan. Somewhere in the 1870s, two people, Mary Towles Sasseen and Frank Hearing organized another Mother's Day sometime in the late 19th century and the early 20th century. They were both renowned as the "father of Mother's Day".

The "official" Mother's Day holiday came to being in the 1900s as a result of Anna Jarvis, daughter of Ann Reeves Jarvis. After her mother's death in 1905, Anna Jarvis started Mother's Day as a way to celebrate and honor how mothers sacrifice so much for their children.

After getting a lot of financial backing from a department store owner, John Wanamaker, located in Philadelphia, they organized the first official Mother's Day celebration in May 1908. They celebrated it in a Methodist church in West Virginia. They also saw thousands of people attend the Mother's Day event in one of John Wanamaker's stores in Philadelphia. After the amazing success of the Mother's Day celebration, Ann Jarvis decided to make the holiday a national holiday added onto the calendar. She started a letter writing campaign to newspapers and politicians stating that most American holidays were biased with male achievements.

By 1912, most of the states, churches, and towns in America had added Mother's Day as an annual holiday. Ann Jarvis also created the Mother's Day International Association to bring light to her cause. In 1914, her goal had been achieved as President Woodrow Wilson signed to make Mother's Day a national holiday as the second Sunday in May.

After creating Mother's Day as a day of honoring and celebrating mothers, she actually intended the holiday to be different. She intended the holiday for people to visit churches or their mother while wearing a white carnation flower as a sort of "badge". Though, once Mother's Day became a national holiday, there wasn't long before the commercialization of the holiday began.

Florists and card companies had the first hand in the commercialization of Mother's Day, selling flowers and cards in gargantuan bunches. Ann Jarvis had initially worked with florists to help raise light to Mother's Day. By 1920 she was appalled by how the florists she worked with commercialized Mother's Day to an extent that she publicly denounced the commercialization and urged people to stop buying Mother's Day cards and flowers.

Ann Jarvis then held a public campaign against people profiting from Mother's Day, publicly speaking against florists, confectioners, and even entire charities. She also launched lawsuits against any and every kind of group that used "Mother's Day" in their name. Eventually, she spent most of her personal wealth and time in legal fees, and by the time she died in 1948, she disowned the holiday and even actively urged people to stop celebrating the holiday.
